Mary Jane Roberts, Clark was born Aug. L, 1647 in England.

When she was a few months old she came to America with her parents,
John and Dorothy Martin Roberts. Her father died in St. Louis Mc.
in 1858. Leaving my Grandmother Dorothy Martin Roberts a widow
with three small children. Mother the youngest. Grandmother
came to Utah with other saints and sattled in in Parowan. I have
been told by some of mothers aquaintances that she was a beautiful girl and that her character was just as beautiful as was
her looks. She had quite grail health, caused from a weak heart.
This handycaped her from accomplishing many things she would have
liked to have done. Although she was a very ambishus person,
often working beyond her strength. I am very proud and happy
to pag a short tribute to my mother.

I can look back now at my age and more appreciate the love and devotation she gave her family. Also I was a child and young girl can remember of her often speaking of a few of her very true friends, and many times I have seen them in our home, Mrs Sarah Amu Adams, Mrs. Maggie Richards, Mrs. Caroline R. Adams, Mrs., Juliatte Adems and others. I have heard her speak of her dear friend and neighbor, Agusta Mitchell, (Walter Mitchell's) mother. Few people really knew what faith, mother had in the gospel. She being quiet and reserved in her nature. She was always faithful with her tithes and offerings. Her faith in prayer was contatanding. So much so, that two times in her life she had almost mericles happen through her prayers. I have heard her tell it. Bro. Morgan Richards also made mention of the same thing at her funeral. In her early married life she did not have many luxuries, and she worked hard and made butter and cheese, which she exchanged for furniture that was made by people in our own town.

Some of these things were, bedstead, cupboard, chests, etc.

Mother was 18 years when she married my father, Nov. 27, 1865.

Later they were sealed in the L. D. S. Endowment house. Oct.

3, 1868. She passed away at the age of 54 years. Feb. 10,1902.
