

KRISTI'S CORNER

I think every reader has a criteria for what they read. It can be by author, genre, or mood. I employ all of these when I pick a book, and the two books I am going to review were chosen because of their synopsis. Divine Rivals and Ruthless Vows by Rebecca Ross were listed as The Enchanted Letters Duology and it was for this reason that I picked them up. Set some time in the past during a time of war-shattering loss (think World War I), Iris E. Winnow and Roman C. Kitt are rivals at the local newspaper for a columnist position. Iris has just lost her brother to the war, and her mother has died; in desperation, she writes letters to her missing brother, sliding them into her wardrobe. One day, she receives a letter back-but not from her brother. And a mysterious relationship continues from there. These two books discuss loss, love, and those left behind. I love Iris and Roman, who become more than rivals through shared hardships and loss. But what brought them together was their beautifully written words. I read an online criticism of these books that stated that the two characters being in their teens would not have had the presence of mind or emotional maturity to survive in the way they did. And totally I disagree with that assessment. The critic who wrote that statement actually loved the books, and this was their only criticism. But I think extreme circumstances such as war bring out levels of emotions in all who are involved-particularly the young. Iris and Roman are wonderful characters and reading Divine Rivals will certainly inspire you to read Ruthless Vows. They are equally as good, but I think I liked Ruthless Vows just a little more. And that's unusual for a sequel. These are magical books not only in their content but in Ross's writing. These are designated as Young Adult Fiction, but I can honestly say that this should not be seen as a limitation because they are great reads for any age.


